Hear the laughter of children, smell charcoal drifting through the air, feel a breeze blowing through the campground. With almost 14,000 acres of water, all this and more is yours to discover at Jordan Lake. Thirteen miles of the shoreline are in the state park, which provides boating access. With 124 acres of land and nearly two miles of trails, visitors can experience a wide variety of the area's natural surroundings and wildlife. Things to do: Education and events, fishing, hiking

The cliffs, however, remain virtually unaltered, standing as a journal of the geological and biological history of the land. Located at the eastern end of Bogue Banks, one of a series of barrier islands along the North Carolina coast, the park is surrounded on three sides by water—the Atlantic Ocean, Beaufort Inlet and Bogue Sound. This area of undisturbed natural beauty is the perfect place to explore salt marches and estuaries vital to the coastal ecosystem.
